

Today we're profiling Kimberly Hall, the Director of Development at Circle the City in Phoenix, Arizona. Previously, she served as Director of Donor Development for Goodwill of Central and Northern Arizona. She is passionate about working with the valley's homeless population, and founded a nonprofit organization in 2009, the HOPE Project, to provide resources and support to individuals and families experiencing homelessness. In an effort to build a legacy of giving, she and her family assemble and deliver "blessing bags"—care packages for the homeless filled with essentials. She serves as a mentor to valley youth through her involvement with Future Business Leaders of America, and volunteers her time with numerous organizations including Lighthouse, The Salvation Army, Big Brothers Big Sisters of America, and the HOPE Project. In 100 words or less, describe your work.

I serve as Director of Development for Circle the City in Phoenix, Arizona. CTC is focused on healthcare for the homeless. I have the privilege of building relationships and raising money to support the ongoing efforts to provide healthcare without distinction for those experiencing homelessness. In Maricopa County, more than 22,000 people experienced homelessness in 2017. Circle the City is well positioned to provide services to 10,000 individuals experiencing homelessness this year. I am glad to be a part of the vision to create a healthier community without homelessness.

You're in a book club, and it's your turn to pick the next title. What do you choose and why?

Leaders Eat Last, by Simon Sinek. This book embraces servant leadership and embodies the principles therein. Imagine how much more productive and profitable organizations would be if all leaders put their people before protocol and process.
